DESCRIPTION

Rapid Prompting Method (RPM) is an instructional technique designed to develop academic, language and communication skills in individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder and allied traumatic brain injury and genetic disorders such as cerebral palsy, down's syndrome etc. RPM uses a "Teach-Ask" paradigm for eliciting responses through intensive verbal, auditory, visual and/or tactile prompts.

RPM is an education method that leads to communication. It uses empirical and rational approaches to teaching concepts. RPM is a method that through practice, patience and consistency can be used by parents and professionals with their students. This workshop will expand opportunities to students, parents and professionals' information, exposure, instruction and training in Rapid Prompting Method

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- a) Improving communication for persons with autism and similar disorders.
- b) To bring the student to maximum learning through the open learning channel.
- c) To elicit the best out of the child to enable maximum output in that given time.

METHODOLOGY

HALO is dedicated to the use of Soma Mukhopadhyay's Rapid Prompting Method (RPM) for improving academic success and communication for persons with autism and similar disorders.

RPM is used to teach academics, and communication is also taught in the process. Despite behaviors, the academic focus of every RPM lesson is designed to activate the reasoning part of the brain so that the student becomes distracted by and engaged in learning.

RPM is distinct from other methods as it is based upon how the brain works. The aim is to bring the student to maximum learning through the open learning channel and to elicit the best (not simply to test) out of the child to enable maximum output in that given time. As a student's cognitive and motor proficiency increases, the sophistication of a student's response also improves.

RPM uses prompting to initiate a student's independent response, without physical support. In addition to teaching letter-chart pointing, RPM also utilizes stencils and other drawing exercises to lead to independent handwriting.
